About the sessions

• Pasture Principles – Basil Doonan, Macquarie Franklin

The aim of *Pasture Principles* is to provide farmers with a set of guiding principles that will allow them to manage confidently regardless of the season, situation or system. The coaching program includes six sessions run over a twelve-month period and is suitable for participants involved in the sheep and beef industries. Key areas covered include:

- An understanding pasture requirements, growth and quality
- Allocation of pasture on a dry matter basis
- The relationship between stocking rate and pasture utilisation
- Animal requirements for maintenance, growth, pregnancy and lactation
- Feed budgeting and planning
- Marginal cost and marginal revenue decisions associated with feeding livestock

• Lifting Lamb Survival – Nathan Scott, Achieve AG Solutions

Lifting Lamb Survival is a practical on-farm training program focusing on learning and applying management practices to improve lamb and ewe survival. The program runs from pre-lambing to until after marking with four separate sessions. Participants will learn:

- o Strategies to improve lamb survival and reduce ewe wastage
- Best practice management for lambing
- How to prepare the ewes and their lambing paddocks to enable a better lambing
- \circ $\;$ How to increase the kilograms of wool and/or lamb produced per hectare

• Making Better On-Farm Investments – Hilary Beech, Holmes Sackett

The objective of *Making Better On-Farm Investments* is to help farm business managers develop the skills, knowledge and confidence to identify the next best place to spend a dollar on farm. Upon completion of the program participants will be able to:

- Identify expense activities competing for capital
- Conduct a partial budget
- Identify costs and benefits related to an investment
- Use tools to conduct an investment analysis

- Assess the risks related to different investments
